POLICE ARREST FAIRFIELD MAN AFTER ALTERCATION, SHOOTING

Vacaville police arrested a Fairfield man after a disturbance that resulted in shots being fired at a local apartment building.

Late Thursday night, police received a call of a man brandishing a handgun in the 1300 block of Callen Street. While officers responded to the area, Dispatch received information that shots were being fired outside of an apartment in the same area.

Officers responding to the scene quickly established a perimeter and located a man matching the description provided by the persons who called. Officers contacted the man, who immediately crouched down behind a parked vehicle. The suspect, later identified as Gurpreet Takhar, 25, of Fairfield ultimately emerged from behind the vehicle and was arrested after an ECD (electronic control device) was used to get him to comply with commands. Officers located a handgun in the location from which S-Takhar had emerged.

S-Takhar was medically cleared and booked into Solano County Jail for assault with a deadly weapon, criminal threats, possession of stolen property, carrying a loaded firearm in public and negligent discharge of a firearm.

Officers were unable to locate where the bullets impacted and no one was injured.
